

A talk linked to the butterfly

Introduction: Good evening, everyone! Today, I want to share with you a beautiful story from nature that can teach us a lot about life, growth, and the importance of being in the right place. Let's think about a butterfly for a moment. Have you ever watched a butterfly fluttering in the garden, flying freely from flower to flower? They help provide education, healthcare, and community support, ensuring that individuals and families are in a place where they can grow, flourish, and live out their full potential.

Just like the butterfly needs the right surroundings to fly, people need the right support, love, and opportunities to grow. Jengana helps make this possible for so many in Kenya, creating the conditions for real transformation in people's lives.

Bringing It Home: So, what can we learn from the butterfly and the work of Jengana? First, God has a unique plan for each of us. He knows where we need to be, and He places us in the right situations to help us grow. Sometimes, we might feel like the caterpillar, waiting for our moment to spread our wings, but we can trust that God knows what's best for us.

Second, we can help others find the right place to grow, just like Jengana does in Kenya. We can support those in need, offer encouragement, and help create environments where others can flourish—whether that's in our school, community, or across the world.

Conclusion: Let's remember the lesson of the butterfly: when we are in the right place, we can truly flourish. And let's do what we can to help others find that place, so they too can live the life God has designed for them.

To reinforce the message of the talk and provide a hands-on activity, you could introduce a simple butterfly craft that ties into the themes of transformation and flourishing in the right place.

Butterfly Craft Idea: "Create and Flourish"

Materials:

- Paper plates (one per child)
- Scissors
- Markers, crayons, or colored pencils
- Glue sticks
- Colorful tissue paper or construction paper
- Pipe cleaners (for the antennae)
- Butterfly wing template (optional)
- Optional: flower stickers or cutouts

Instructions:

1. Create the Wings:

- Start by cutting a paper plate in half. These will serve as the butterfly's wings.
- If desired, you can provide a butterfly wing template for the children to trace and cut out instead.

2. Decorate the Wings:

 Give each child markers, crayons, or colored pencils to decorate their butterfly wings. 4. Assemble the Butterfly:

- Glue the decorated wings to the back of the butterfly's body, making sure the wings are spread out.
- If using flower stickers or cutouts, you can decorate the craft space around the butterfly, symbolizing how flowers help butterflies flourish—just like the right opportunities help us grow.

5. Personal Connection:

 On the butterfly's body or wings, encourage the children to write a word or phrase that reminds them of the talk.
It could be something like "God's Plan," "Flourish," "Growth," or even "Jengana." This will remind them of the message whenever they look at their butterfly.

6. Closing Reflection:

 As the children complete their butterflies, gather them in a circle. Ask them to hold up their butterflies and reflect on how, just like the butterfly, they too will flourish when they are in the right place—surrounded by love, support, and opportunities.
